



Data Quality

 Populations of 10,000 or more can expect a 2% variation due to sampling

 Populations of 400 can expect a 10% variation due to sampling 2% Mean of population

Note: consideration when deciding how deep to dive into the data and how much variation is worth noting

Low Income Entry and Exit Rates of Tax Filers in Simcoe County, 2019-2020

Low Income **Entry Rate** of Tax Filers in Simcoe County between 2019 and 2020 by Variables of Interest


- Simcoe County compared to Ontario and Canada (2.7 vs 3.1 and 3.1)
- Females compared to males (3.0 vs 2.4)
- those 18-24 years old (4.1)
- those living in single-parent families (5.3), single parent families with at least one child under 17 (7.3) and those not in a census family (5.1)
- Recent immigrant tax filers (lived in Canada for 0-5 years) (5.1)
- Orillia (3.7), Midland (3.6) and Adjala-Tosorontio (3.4)

Low Income **Exit Rate** of Tax Filers in Simcoe County between 2019 and 2020 by Variables of Interest

- Simcoe County compared to Ontario and Canada (45.2 vs 43.7 and 42.0)
- those 65 and above (34.4), those 55-64 (37.2)
- those **not in a census family (34.4)**
- Penetanguishene (33.3), Midland (34.6) and Tay (35.7)



Persistence of Low Income in Simcoe County, 2013-2020





Persistence of Low Income for 5-9 Years in Simcoe County between 2013 and 2020

Simcoe County compared to Ontario and Canada (8.1% vs 11.4% and 11.3%)

Average Length of a Low Income Spell for Filers 18+ in Simcoe County between 2013 and 2020

Simcoe County compared to Ontario and Canada (1.85 vs 1.91 and 1.94)

Females vs males (1.90 vs 1.76)

18 to 24 years and 65 years and above (1.76 and 1.74)
