

2016 Census

On May 3, 2017, Statistics Canada released its second set of data from the 2016 Census, on age and sex, type of dwelling and the Census of Agriculture.

The greying of Canada's population is accelerating, as new census numbers show seniors now outnumber children for the first time in the survey's history.



Ontario to launch guaranteed minimum income pilot program in Hamilton, Lindsay, and Thunder Bay


Premier Kathleen Wynne announced that the Ontario Basic Income Pilot (OBIP) will give up to 4,000 low-income earners in Hamilton, Lindsay, and Thunder Bay a basic annual income of \$17,000. Couples would earn \$24,000 and people with disabilities would earn up to \$6,000 on top of the basic amount.

Participants are eligible to work but their basic income will decrease by \$0.50 for every dollar they earn by working. This project is meant to evaluate the replacement of the Ontario Works Program.

The Ontario government will invest \$50 million each year for the three-year pilot
