	Simcoe County is a large geographic area with urban rural diversity and significant population growth in various areas of the County. The County has an aging population where transportation can be an issue and relies heavily on volunteers. Delivery of services has also been a challenge (example, travelling to medical appointments), especially during the Pandemic. The Ministry of Transportation had identified that community transportation needs differ with each community. Initially, the grant was a one time two-year funding opportuning from 2015 to 2017. The Ministry extended the funding for 5 more years from 2018 to 2023. The Ministry just announced that they will extend the grant for a third iteration, taking this grant to 2025. The County's role was to develop the grant proposal in working with the partners to develop the grant proposal and manage the project. The County partnered with Caredove as the vendor who developed the software program as funded by the Ministry of Transportation.

A roundtable discussion took place regarding local community initiatives. A	groups in his area.
summary of the discussions are below: <u>Deputy Mayor Anita Dubeau, Council Representative</u> – The Town of Penetanguishene continues work on the Community Well-Being Plan. An Age- Friendly workshop is taking place this evening (September 21 st). Contact Deputy Mayor Anita Dubeau (<u>adubeau@penetanguishene.ca</u>) for more information. <u>Åsa Klint Piqgott, Manager, Performance, Quality & Development, County of</u> <u>Simcoe</u> – The Annual Age-Friendly Seniors Housing Grant Program supports seniors in the County of Simcoe communities with age-friendly housing upgrades, including accessible, adaptable and inclusive designs that allow older individuals to continue to live independently. Yearly, Council approves \$500,000 in funding to support this initiative and applicants are eligible for this grant if they are seniors living in one of our eighteen (18) member municipalities. This year, the 2021 Age-Friendly Seniors Housing Grant closed June 30 th . The County received at total of 103 applications, as compared with 54 last year, 76 the year prior and 30 application the first year. The majority of accessibility projects applied for by individuals are to convert bathrooms, walkways, and to add stair lifts and grab bars. Due to the increase in application numbers, the total funding awarded exceeded the \$500,000 annual funding. There were funds leftover from previous years that were allocated towards this year's program. The total funding awarded for 2021 was \$654,058 for applicants across all municipalities within Simcoe County. The Municipal Grant that was delayed this year and will be distributed by November 1 st . This grant gives local municipalities a potential to apply for funding to be applied towards age-friendly activities and projects within their own municipalities. Tracy Hill, who has joined us as Age-Friendly Coordinator will be assuming Age-Friendly responsibilities over the next few months. A public report will be completed and reported to County Council. Christina Strong, Public Awareness Coordinator, Independent Living Services, Barrie – Independent Living Services (ILS) Simcoe County will being holding their Annual General Meeting on September 30 th via Zoom. Go to the ILS website for more information - https://www.ilssimcoe.ca/. The Accessibility Resources and Connections section provides a guidance for people navigating for funding, looking for more information and connecting people to other resources. In 2020, ILS has helped over 456 people purchase 136 different assistive devices at a cost of \$63,544. As donations have been through service clubs and faith communities brought in towards our centralized funding pool, their fundraising efforts were diminished due to the pandemic which resulted in less money coming in to our funding pool to help fund these devices. https://www.goquipit.com/ is a free online classified website created to buy, sell, or give away gently used equipment such as hospital beds, wheelchairs, and bathroom safety devices. ILS continues to provide personal support services and assisted living services throughout this pandemic to high risk seniors and people with disabilities. The Navigator at ILS contacted CARP Barrie (Canadian Association of Retired Persons). CARP Barrie started a seniors grant program for seniors 65 plus and low income. Those who quality for the CARP seniors grant may receive funds to help pay for transportation, veterinary bills, clothing, food, etc. CARP Barrie is working with the ILS navigator to help answer questions and help people navigate the grant. <u>Gayle Hall, Chief Librarian, County of Simcoe</u> – County libraries are back open to the public with limited numbers and hours. However, libraries have not opened their meeting rooms for occupancy. The libraries are continuing with virtual programing with many programs directed towards seniors. The Springwater Library just received a Trillium Grant for creative seniors programming. They will be doing online rug hooking, water colour painting and acrylic painting sessions. Many of our libraries have online quilting clubs, rug hooking, etc. that are all directed towards seniors programming. The libraries have been involved in the seniors survey with Community Connections and promoting this survey at the circulation desks and online. Libraries are also photocopying and laminating vaccination forms for seniors free if charge and have had up to 100-150 people per day using this service.	
<u>Jim Gough, Seniors' Representative</u> – Using a walker to help get around and on continues on oxygen. On the lung transplant list that will go active in a month. Community Paramedics continue to stay in contact.	
Judy Contin, Executive Director Askennonia Senior Centre - Askenonia Seniors Centre is still closed and continues with virtual and outdoor programming.	
<u>Kari Warnar, Community Safety and Wellbeing, Avail Consulting</u> – Avail Consulting is working with the County as a consultant for the Community Safety and Wellbeing program. The Community Safety and Wellbeing Plans were developed, presented and adopted by the municipalities and posted by the deadline of July 1 st . The next phase is Phase 2, Year 1 of the four-year plan. This month, we are meeting with the local governance groups and

geographical municipal leadership - CAOs and representatives from each of the municipalities. The next step is to form local Community Safety and Wellbeing Tables in the areas of North Simcoe, Nottawasaga, South Simcoe, Couchiching, South Georgian Bay and Springwater.	
Kris Houston, Project Champion, Project Lifesaver – Project Lifesaver continues to distribute bracelets in retirement homes to help protect vulnerable citizens. A launch will be taking place soon in Collingwood, Wasaga Beach and Blue Mountain. Currently, there are about 30 participants with bracelets. As clients are moved into Long-Term Care, the bracelets are redistributed. Discussed a follow-up with the Allandale Retirement Home and will contact the Simcoe Muskoka District Health Unit.	
Laura Lynn Borassa, Alzheimer's Society – Today is World Alzheimer's Day and encouraging everyone to reflect on the support given through work and personal involvement. Bringing back in-person programming this month in all of our program areas. Social recreation programs such as Minds in Motion, education and support groups have scheduled some in-person sessions with COVID precautions with some locations requiring proof of vaccination. Groups will be smaller and continue to offer online programs and the Alzheimerer's Society continues operating in a hybrid manner. The Alzheimer Society has a Navigator to assist persons who are newly diagnosed with a dementia or who are supporting a person with dementia. Sanju Hirji, Alzheimer's Society Navigator can be reached at <u>Sanju.hirji@alzheimersociety.ca</u> .	
Lucia Ricardo, Seniors Advisory Committee and CNIB Simcoe Muskoka – CNIB has created separate pillars. The Orientation and Mobility, the Connect Living Services and Low Vision Assessments take place through vision loss rehab which is part of CNIB located at 5 Quarry Ridge, Barrie. This is done through a referral process. The second pillar encompasses psycho-social programming, a technology instruction and sports-related activity-related peer support at our new office at 90 Collier Street, Unit 5, Barrie. This is officially called the Nanji Family Foundation SmartLife Centre (Community Hub). This centre is for Smartlife appliances for purchase and for onsite view on how they operate with an onsite tech available for questions and help. National Psycho- social programming continues.	
<u>Margaret Adolphe, Chair Accessibility Committee of Collingwood</u> – The Accessibility Advisory Committee is meeting and looking at transit optimization and will be looking at transportation issues during COVID. The Committee brings forth issues and barriers for accessibility. For example, lights at crossings are too high for those in wheelchairs. The Collingwood Library is also laminating vaccine certificates daily.

Mayor Sandie Macdonald, Council Representative – In Essa, many seniors who have sold their homes are renting and now in hotels. e are encouraging developers to rent 600-800 square foot rentals so they're affordable to seniors. We are also looking at Transportation as it goes to only one area on the outskirts of town for shopping. The Essa Library runs programs for seniors with quite a bit of participation.	
<u>Sherry Teeter, Community Connection/211 Central East Ontario</u> – Regarding the Seniors Survey, about 600 have been completed so far and we are hoping to get at least 1,000. In trying to target those isolated seniors, there has been great support from Home and Community Care, Meals on Wheels, and Home for Life to support isolated seniors and ask them to share their needs and wants. We will report back the survey results in the November Age-Friendly Advisory Committee Meeting. 211 is still receiving ongoing referrals from Paramedics and other healthcare professionals who are referring their vulnerable patients. System navigation and advocacy is ongoing and we will be utilizing survey results to inform the project.	
<u>Carolyn Jones, Simcoe Muskoka District Health Unit</u> – Sarah Orr-Shaw has been redeployed back and will continue to support partnerships.	
<u>Michelle Pauzé, Director Seniors Services, County of Simcoe</u> – As Directives change and restrictions are lifted, more visitors are being allowed to come into the County's retirement and long-term care homes. Screening is being done with anyone coming into the buildings. Programming has increased with smaller groups and we continue with virtual programming. Our Homes have proceeded with some successful outdoor entertainment. The Adult Day Program reopened and has been able to increase clientele to about five per day.	
Jane Sinclair, General Manager, Health & Emergency Services – The County has implemented a Mandatory Vaccination Policy for all employees in our Community Services and Long-Term Care Homes. The County's policy is in place with new deadlines in place advising staff that they must be vaccinated by October 1st with the first vaccine and November 1st with the second vaccine completed or the employee will be off work without pay until provisions are met. We move forward with these significant measures to protect our seniors and our staff. We do have significantly high rates of 95% of all staff with their first does and about 90% fully vaccinated. We are also requiring our volunteers and contract staff to be fully vaccinated.

Community Transportation Committee

- → Established in 2012 as part of the Care Connections strategy
- → Purpose: Inform and advise on a consistent and coordinated transportation system to improve timely, efficient, & seamless access to health and community services
- → Membership included community agencies and partners, NSM LHIN, and County of Simcoe (chair)



Community Transportation Pilot Grant Program

- 1. Project funding from the Ministry of Transportation
 - → Improve mobility options for vulnerable people
 - → Build capacity to better meet local demand
 - → Create networks to coordinate and leverage existing community services & resources
- 1. Two phases of funding: 1) service provider portal 2) public-facing

Community Transportation (CT) Link Network

- → Simcoe County transportation initiative
- → Accessible transportation* for frail elderly and disabled adults
 - Eligibility is based on partner agency eligibility criteria
- → Rides to vaccination and non-urgent medical appointments
- → Transportation providers use Caredove software to receive ride requests & share unfulfilled rides



caredove

→ Referral management & service marketing software platform

→ Caredove's helps people remain healthy, happy and independent at home by simplifying access to trusted local community services







caredove

→ Helps community agencies promote services to key referral sources

- e.g., HCCSS, OHTs, hospitals, caregivers, 211, etc.
- Clinicians can securely send referrals on behalf of clients

Ride Sharing Portal Results

- → 900+ rides have been fulfilled by a partner*
 - Medical appointments & procedures
 - Majority of trips are between municipalities (e.g., Barrie to Toronto)
- → Transportation scheduler can post an unfilled ride in under 2 minutes
 - Collaborating partner can view & fill rides instantly on portal
- → Over 50,000 km travelled
 - That's 1.3 trips around the world!





FAQs


- → All providers* offer vaccination rides at no charge. Other trips are charged based on distance travelled.
- → You do not need to be an existing transportation client to request service. Existing clients can call to schedule rides like they normally would.
- → Most providers will pick up within a certain region, but drive outside their region to get you to your appointment.
- → Clients without internet access can call 211 or the provider directly.
- → Community transportation is different from public transit (e.g., Simcoe LINX)

It is funded by the Government of Canada New Horizons for Seniors Program







Background

Reach Out and Touch Someone was implemented during the COVID-19 pandemic to help address social isolation among seniors in the Midland/ Penetanguishene area.


We also wanted to support seniors in navigating their new and evolving needs resulting from the pandemic.



Reach Out and Touch Someone has now become a catch -all for any number of issues facing seniors.

The program has been operating for approximately three months with an overwhelming request for service.

To date we have reached over 50 seniors with unique and challenging scenarios.



Target Population

We are available to assist any senior in need. You do not have to be connected with Askennonia Senior Centre. A direct number for this program is advertised publicaly and also given by the center if contacted.

We are hoping to connect with vulnerable and marganilized seniors and those facing increased barriers.

What We Do

There are many resources available to support the diverse needs of seniors; however, there are always service gaps. Seniors may be unaware of existing supports due to the method or mode that the information is communicated and the frequent changes in funding, structure and availability of these programs.

Seniors may also have difficulty applying for these programs if they do not have the technical knowledge and capability to follow through with the designated process.

The Reach Out and Touch Someone program will effectively assess and prioritize needs, provide immediate assistance, navigation and connection. We will provide extensive follow-up to ensure the senior is successful and does not fall though the cracks. We provide a flexible service that works with the individual's unique needs.
